CAST BIOS

JESSE CHARLES — "Tom Edwards"

FILM SYNOPSIS

SHORT: After his best friend disappears, Tom Edwards is investigated by a relentless detective as he tries to lead a normal summer. Tom fears facing the truth and struggles to cope with the loss of his friend as the world around him seems to fall apart.

LONG: Tom Edwards, a troubled, young man, begins to lose his grip on reality when a relentless detective investigates the disappearance of his best friend. All signs point to Tom as the prime suspect. Meanwhile, tensions rise between Tom and his girlfriend, Jamie, as they hide the truth from each other and struggle to keep the detective from destroying their relationship from the inside out. The strange and unexplainable events that follow Tom aren't what they seem. Is there really something sinister out in the woods surrounding their quiet town, or is Tom covering for an unspeakable crime?

The truth is violently revealed.

PRODUCTION NOTES:

The film was shot in Southwest Michigan and Northern Indiana over the course of three weeks. The project was led by Kyle Misak, Don Chase, and Jesse Charles. It was not uncommon to be working 14 - 16 hour shoot days throughout the production. With over 40 different locations in the film, the cast and crew were constantly on the move. Having befriended some amazing veteran actors in Carel Struycken, Larry Hankin, and Jeffrey Weissman, director Kyle Misak asked each of them to make an appearance in the film as a favor to him, to which they all agreed.

The most challenging scene in the film to shoot was the drowning sequence, which was filmed in the middle of the night on a swampy lake. With limited lights and resources, it was a challenging process trying to get all of the shots needed to tell the story. All of the sound was re-recorded and designed in post-production, as it wasn't possible to record sound on location given the circumstances. After 2 years of post-production, the film was finally finished.

DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT:

From Director Kyle Misak: "The Eden Theory was a big undertaking and a very challenging film to make. With a tiny budget and a small team, we shot in Southwest Michigan and Northern Indiana for 3 grueling weeks. Despite the challenges and lack of sleep, we finished principlephotography and were able to move into post, which brought its own challenges. After many months in that stage, the film was finally brought to completion, and we're proud to say that we finished the movie. *The Eden Theory* is very much a critical-thinking type of movie. It requires the viewer to pay close attention. We spent a lot of time talking through the story and the intricate details of things, as we wanted to create something unique; something that would challenge its audience. While on the surface, things may be confusing, all of the clues and information are there to answer every question. We hope that people enjoy the mystery and continue to ponder the story long after they watch it."
